Colonial Club Celebrates the Class of 1969 at Reunions!




Bob Durkee: A Princeton Career

When Bob Durkee '69 first enrolled at Princeton in 1965, he initially didn't realize he was coming to an all-male University. Ranked #1 in his high school, he was used to taking classes mostly with female students. By the time he graduated college in 1969, however, he would go on to play a role in transitioning Princeton to coeducation, and eventually all three of his daughters would attend Princeton, in the classes of 1993, 1996, and 1999.

In college, Bob spent most of his time at the 'Prince' headquarters at 48 University Place. At the time, most of the Daily Princetonian leadership joined Colonial Club, and he followed suit accordingly. He realized, however, that he was arriving for meals at the last minute and then leaving right away to go back to the paper. (Still, he was one of the few members who regularly came for breakfast.) Not being able to take full advantage of the social life at Colonial, and also not seeing his roommates much, Bob decided to switch in his senior year to Quadrangle so that he could see his roommates there. He had seven roommates, all of whom were in Quad or Tower Club. It was almost unheard of at the time to switch clubs, so a dean pulled Bob into his office to ask if everything was OK. Bob assured him it was! After graduation he initially wasn't listed as an alumnus of either club; Colonial generated its alumni list from graduating seniors and Quad from new sophomores, and Bob had been neither. It was only after later revealing this while coincidentally sitting on a plane with a club president that he was able to get himself on both alumni lists.

While writing for the 'Prince,' Bob received a lot of attention for being the first to report that Bob Goheen, the University's President, felt it inevitable that the University would switch to co-education. In those days, the Prince was a much bigger presence on campus than today. Basically everyone read it every day and it was the major - if not only - source for news and information on campus. He still recalls in vivid detail every event in the process leading up to the admission of the first women undergraduates in 1969. His notes from his interview on this topic with President Goheen are now on display at Frist Campus Center.

After graduation, he spent three years teaching fifth grade in Trenton while living in Princeton, before joining the University administration and working in Nassau Hall. He continued working in Nassau Hall for more than 47 years. Over time, he gained responsibility for many of the University's external relations functions, from the University's relationship with the town of Princeton, to the state and federal governments, as well as the media, the alumni, and the public more broadly. For the last 15 years of his career Bob was also responsible for the University's Board of Trustees, which recently held a committee meeting at Colonial Club that included ex-officio trustee Governor Phil Murphy.

Over his time in Princeton, Bob has acquired an encyclopedic knowledge of the University and its history, and in retirement has fittingly taken on the task of updating A Princeton Companion, an encyclopedia about Princeton originally published by the Princeton University Press in 1978. These days he spends his work days at a carrel in Firestone library researching and writing. No-one else could do a better job!

Demetrius Vereen

Alumni INTERVIEW SERIES

This interview in our alumni series is with Daniel Pedraza POL'13 and Yi Liao CHM'11.

Q: How did you two meet?

We met at Colonial in the Spring of 2011, but we actually got to know each other while we were both staying at the club that summer. Yi sent an email asking if anyone wanted to watch the original X-Men trilogy in the movie room, and Dan was the only one to join. Over the next several weeks many more movie nights ensued, and many of Chris Shuck's famous whiskey sours were consumed. Countless great memories were forged between us and with the other rowdy Colonial residents during what we now refer to as the Legendary Summer of 2011.

Q: Tell us a bit about what you did at Princeton.

The big overlap between our Princeton lives was Colonial. Yi graduated after Dan's sophomore year, but she continued to visit frequently while Dan was Recruitment Chair and Vice President of the club in his junior and senior years. While an undergrad, Yi was a Chemistry major who sang with the Tigressions, danced with Triple 8, and took part in the Creative Writing program. Dan was a Politics major who dabbled in theater with PUP and was active in CAUSA and Accion Latina (now Princeton Latinos y Amigos).

Q: What have you been up to since graduating?

After graduating in 2011, Yi stayed on campus that summer to finish up her research project on nanoparticles a great choice (for obvious reasons). She then worked as a consultant for IBM before attending Wharton Business School. Dan graduated in 2013 and attended Columbia Law School. At Reunions 2015, we got engaged at Colonial and celebrated heartily with our friends and family all weekend long!

After we both finished our graduate programs in 2016, we moved to Jersey City and worked in New York — Dan as an associate at a law firm and Yi as a product manager at a telemedicine company. More than anything, we dreamed of a life that was rich in experiences and minimal in material possessions, where we would have the freedom to stretch ourselves, see new things, and feel at home anywhere we went.

Q: What is your favorite memory from your travels?

Last October, we spent about 3 weeks traveling across Southern Utah visiting the "Mighty Five" National Parks — Arches, Canyonlands, Capitol Reef, Bryce Canyon, and Zion — as well as jaw-dropping State Parks like Dead Horse Point. Some of the most incredible landscapes and night skies we've ever seen were from that leg of our journey, where we felt such sustained. profound awe every single day that we knew we had made the right decision to pursue our dream.

Q: Where are you now? Do you think you'll get back on the road

After our year of living the RV life and exploring the country, we decided to settle down in Denver, Colorado! But just because we're not traveling full-time anymore doesn't mean our time on the road is over. Road-tripping is part of our DNA as a couple, and we're looking forward to making more memories on the road together and, eventually, with our future kids. One of the biggest reasons for picking Denver was the easy access to outdoor recreation and RV country,

He also served on non-profit boards, including the Minnesota Nature Conservancy. Don Morrison Kelley Jr. '53 Don was born in New York City and came to Princeton from the Brooks School. He majored in history and wrote his thesis on "The National Elections of 1852." He was a member of Colonial Club. After graduation he served in the Army in Okinawa and met his wife, Vita, a stewardess with Northwest Airlines, while traveling between Okinawa and the United States. Don died Jan. 12, 2019, at home, and his wife died 10 days later. They are survived by their three daughters and six grandchildren.

Charles C. Shenk Jr. '64 Chick died Jan. 2, 2018, of heart failure in Erie, Pa. He was born in Erie Dec. 3, 1941. His father, Charles, and his father's identical twin brother, Allen, were in the Class of 1930, and his cousin Allen Shenk Jr. was in the Class of 1962. At Princeton, Chick rowed freshman and varsity heavyweight crew, participated in Orange Key, and taught Sunday school through the St. Paul's Society. He was a member of Colonial Club. Chick is survived by his niece, Melissa Mock Riorda; nephew Geoffrey Mock; and by Shenk cousins John, Allen, and Wilbur.
